

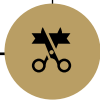
1930

First memorial plaque installed in the Memorial Crypt.



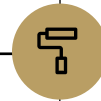
1945

Queensland AIF Units Memorial Committee requests enlargement of crypt for WWII plaques.



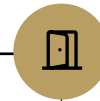
1951

Anzac Square remains an important gathering place for commemoration.



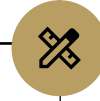
2019

Memorial Galleries curated by State Library of Queensland reopen to the public, offering an interactive journey from WWI to present.



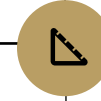
2013

All available space in the Crypt filled, necessitating size restrictions for new plaques.



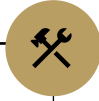
